H. Luke Anderson, from East Bloomfield, New York, is graduating with a doctor of philosophy in ecology and evolutionary biology. His accomplishments reflect his dedication to advancing ecological research, education and community engagement. Luke earned a National Science Foundation graduate research fellowship and a predoctoral

fellowship at the Smithsonian National Museum of Natural History. While at Tulane, he mentored undergraduate students pursuing independent research and honors thesis projects, several of which resulted in peer-reviewed publications. He created and implemented hands-on biology modules for New Orleans schools through his outreach work with the Center for K-12 STEM Education and helped to cultivate a love of science in young students. Luke also collaborated with communities in northwest Ecuador to build capacity and support for ecological research. He has accepted a position as a Rose Postdoctoral Fellow at the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, where he will continue conducting evolutionary biology and genomics research on the Galápagos Islands. **Bobbie Baker,** from Pittsburg, California, is graduating with a bachelor of science in neuroscience with a minor in public health. During her three years as a resident advisor, Bobbie created a welcoming, inclusive environment for upperclassmen at Mayer Residence Hall. She expanded her technical expertise as an information technology intern at the Newcomb Institute,



where she managed computer systems and provided vital tech support. In Bobbie's work as a shadowing liaison with the Research Ambassadors Organization, she forged meaningful connections between undergraduate students and medical professionals and created opportunities for clinical shadowing and research engagement. Her contributions as a research assistant at the Celia Scott Weatherhead School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine focused on sexual health disparities within African American communities in New Orleans. Bobbie also volunteered as a certified emergency medical technician with Tulane EMS, New Orleans EMS and the New Orleans Health Department. Bobbie will return to Tulane in the fall to pursue graduate studies, continuing her impactful public health research and her dedication to community-based service initiatives.



Aryanna J. Baytop, from Los Angeles, is graduating with a bachelor of science in management in management and a minor in economics. Aryanna's passion for service, leadership and academic excellence is reflected in her record of engagement. She received the King Freedom and Justice Community Service Award in recognition of her volunteer work with Hotel

Hope, SOUL Nola, Grace at the Greenlight and her efforts as president of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. In the latter role, she led the group in completing over 190 service hours during fall 2024. Aryanna co-founded Students Against Food Insecurity and used her skills in communication, design and management to coordinate initiatives such as the Battle of the Cans event. As president of Mortar Board Honor Society, Aryanna revitalized the Sophie Newcomb Alpha Sigma Sigma chapter. Her dedication to scholarship led to her induction into Beta Gamma Sigma Honor Society, Mortar Board Senior Honor Society and Alpha Lambda Delta Honor Society. Following graduation, Aryanna will intern with KPMG in San Diego and Manchester, England before returning to Tulane in the fall to complete her master of accounting.

Nathaniel served as class president for the class of 2025 and was an active member of the Medical Student Government throughout his time at the Tulane University School of Medicine. Janae is currently completing the accelerated master in public health program at the Celia Scott Weatherhead School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine as well as training to become a certified breastfeeding specialist. She plans to earn doula certification as well as an accelerated bachelor's in nursing so that she can address severe disparities in maternal mortality as a nurse midwife.



Richard Cantwell, from Indianapolis, Indiana, is graduating with a bachelor of science in management in legal studies in business and a master of accounting. Richie is most proud of his work leading Trash to Treasure, a student organization that reduces waste and raises funds for local nonprofits. Richie oversaw the

expansion of donation locations from four to seven and kept more than 100 tons of materials out of landfills during spring 2024 move-out. In addition, Trash to Treasure raised \$9,000 for New Orleans organizations at the fall move-in sale. Richie and Trash to Treasure received the Keep Louisiana Beautiful Collegiate Environmental Steward Award in recognition of the group's work. Inspired by the mentorship he received as a first-year student, Richie also served as a Wave Leader, TIDES peer mentor and resident advisor and has helped more than 100 students through the many stages of their college careers. Maria is the founding captain of both the Ethics Bowl and Bioethics Bowl teams at Tulane and competed in San Antonio two years in a row. The bowls are competitions based on the collaborative discussion of contemporary ethical dilemmas. Maria shared her skill in these competitions with the students at her alma mater, Bonnabel High School, as coach of their Ethics Bowl team. The group reached the semi-finals in the regional competition. After spending the summer with family and friends and reading a ton of books, Maria will pursue a doctorate in philosophy. Jack Martin Dean, from

Baton Rouge, Louisiana, is graduating with a juris doctor and a certificate in environmental law. Jack is an advocate for environmental justice and equal access to legal services. As a student attorney with the Tulane Environmental Law Clinic, he argued before the United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth



Circuit on behalf of RISE St. James, a faith-based grassroots organization, in an environmental justice and civil rights lawsuit. This work allowed Jack to support some of Louisiana's most resilient and hardest-working community leaders. Jack has particularly treasured his role as director of the Tulane University Legal Assistance Program civil clinic. Through TULAP, he has ensured that Tulane students, faculty and staff receive highquality, affordable legal services and furthered his advocacy for equal access. Jack has also excelled as a mentor and editor, serving as both a Legal Research and Writing Senior Fellow and the Senior Notes & Comments Editor for the Tulane Environmental Law Journal. Following graduation, Jack will take the Georgia Bar and begin his career in Atlanta, pursuing public interest environmental litigation with a focus on clean air initiatives.



Michael A. DeGuzman, from New York City, is graduating with a doctor of public health with a concentration in leadership, advocacy and equity. Michael is a dedicated leader within the public health community, serving as co-president and vicepresident of the Public Health Doctoral Students Organization, providing mentorship and

support to his peers. As a member of the Dean's Student Advisory Council and as the Student Government Association's doctoral student representative, Michael played a key role in voicing student concerns and fostering collaboration between students and faculty. In addition, Michael served as chair of the Asian Healthcare Leaders Community Committee within the American College of Healthcare Executives, where he championed diversity and inclusion in healthcare leadership. Amid his professional and academic achievements, Michael also became a first-time single dad to his 16-year-old son. Following graduation, Michael will work to develop and promote new models integrating complementary philosophies to develop healthcare professionals who can effectively navigate complex systems while staying focused on patient care, safety and quality. Kate Donaghey, from Boston, is graduating with a master of public administration with a certificate in equity-centered education leadership. Kate serves as the chief strategist for Patrick Tuwiler, education secretary for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. In this role, she has helped operationalize more than \$11 billion for education initiatives in the state.



In 2023, Kate and her team provided free community college for eligible people 25+ through MassReconnect and increased enrollment by more than 14,000; established a program that provides resources for professional development and instructional materials to improve literacy rates for children; and ensured the continuation of the Commonwealth Cares for Children program that subsidizes child care assistance. Additionally, Kate and her colleagues updated the state's health and physical education frameworks for the first time in 17 years. Following graduation, Kate will continue to serve Massachusetts Gov. Kimberly Healey's administration as chief of staff and undersecretary, championing educational equity.



Isaiah Epstein-Bagneris,

from New Orleans, is graduating with a bachelor of science in psychology and a bachelor of arts in Africana Studies. One of Isaiah's proudest accomplishments at Tulane has been writing an honors thesis that explores how hip hop serves as a coping mechanism for grieving Black youth. This project integrates developmental psychology,

cultural identity and community resilience — the culmination of Isaiah's academic and research interests. He has presented his research at Howard University's annual Hip Hop Conference twice and is slated to present at the Society for Research in Child Development Conference this month. Beyond his academic pursuits, Isaiah is deeply committed to Jewish education, teaching Hebrew, biblical literature and prayer leadership to children while facilitating discussions on values and social justice. These efforts highlight his dedication to nurturing critical thinking and moral development in younger generations. Following graduation, Isaiah will begin a doctorate in developmental psychology at Tulane under the mentorship of Dr. Michael Cunningham, focusing on cultural resilience and identity development, particularly among Black Americans. Isaiah hopes his work contributes to more culturally responsive understandings of development and resilience within psychology and beyond.

As editor in chief of volume 99 of the Tulane Law Review, Pablo oversaw the publication of distinguished legal scholarship across multiple issues while fostering a sense of community among members and expanding outreach efforts. Association, collaborating with peers to implement an academic success program that supports minority and first-generation law students by broadening access to resources and assistance. Pablo further contributed to Tulane Law School as a peer tutor, student notetaker and member of both the Dean's Advisory and Faculty Interview Committees. His dedication to service extended to volunteering as a tax preparer for the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Clinic and as a Spanish-language translator for the Immigrants' Rights Clinic. After graduation, Pablo will work as a federal judicial law clerk for the Honorable John A. Kazen of the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Texas.



Catherine Eleanor Hawkins,

of Fairhope, Alabama, is graduating with a bachelor of science in engineering in biomedical engineering with a minor in electrical engineering. Catherine has demonstrated exceptional leadership, a commitment to STEM outreach, and a passion for biomedical innovation during her Tulane career. She served in multiple

leadership positions in the Society of Women Engineers, including president, vice president and public relations director. As president, she successfully led a fundraising campaign for STEM education at Esperanza Academy Elementary, raising over \$1,150 through the Pie a Professor initiative. Her work as a student leader in the Toddler Mobility Trainer Biomedical Engineering Service Project, which provides low-cost mobility devices for young children with impairments, remains a highlight for Catherine. In fall 2024, she organized six workshops with Mount Carmel juniors, helping them personalize mobility trainers for future recipients. Additionally, she completed an independent research thesis in the Biomedical Functional Imaging Lab. Her work focused on designing and manufacturing a complex metal housing for photoacoustic imaging that combines ultrasound and laser technologies to detect optical differences in tissue. After graduation, Catherine will work at Medtronic in Lafayette, Colorado, as a quality engineer in the Neuroscience Business Unit.

Abbey Hochreiner, from

Springfield, New Jersey, is graduating with a bachelor of science in management in finance and a bachelor of science in economics. As part of the Altman Program in International Studies and Business, she completed extensive Spanish language instruction and studied abroad in Mérida, Mexico and Barcelona



and Madrid, Spain. Abbey also participated in the top experiential learning courses at the A. B. Freeman School of Business: Burkenroad Reports, the Darwin Fenner Student Managed Fund, and the Selber Jr. Course in Distressed Debt. In those courses, she gained valuable hands-on experience in equity research, portfolio management and alternative investments. Beyond academics, Abbey held multiple leadership roles in the Community Action Council of Tulane University Students, including vice-president and treasurer, where she oversaw more than 40 student-led service clubs and fostered partnerships with local organizations. As president and vice-chair of Global Guides, she reinstated the organization, paired more than 20 exchange students with local peers and secured funding for semester-long events. Following graduation, Abbey will work as an equity research analyst at J.P. Domini Ahzjia-Monyelle Johnson, from Kansas City, Missouri, is graduating with a master of science in sports studies with certificates in sports medicine and sports coaching. Domini provided essential resources, fostered communitybuilding, and offered mentorship to Black queer and trans students on campus as a member of the

executive board of the Black Queer Collective. In their role as a graduate assistant academic advisor for Tulane Athletics, Domini guided students in balancing their academic and athletic pursuits while serving as a steadfast advocate and support system. Domini's contributions to Tulane's Sexual Aggression Peer Hotline and Education organization include updating the resource binder to ensure survivors and peers have access to resources tailored to intersecting identities. Domini has completed bachelor's and master's degrees in neuroscience as well as the current master's degree they are receiving. They have dedicated their life to becoming "the best physician, advocate, mentor, friend, and family member" possible. Following graduation, Domini will begin medical school at Tulane, pursuing a career as an orthopedic surgeon focused on sports medicine. Their ultimate goal is to work in college athletics to aid underserved communities and continue their work in advocacy and social justice.

Kaitlyn A. Lewis, from Simi Valley, California, is graduating with a master of science in tropical medicine. Kaitlyn conducted a study on arboviral transmission focusing on mosquito species responsible for spreading numerous human pathogens. The work will help develop strategies to address the spread of diseases, such as Zika and malaria, that are transmitted



to humans through the bites of infected species of mosquitoes, ticks and flies. Kaitlyn also contributed to a study that developed a new workflow to bridge the gap between in vitro cell culture and animal models, enabling in-depth investigations of mosquitoborne pathogen transmissions. Kaitlyn was part of a team that presented at the American Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene annual conference and also presented her findings on arboviral transmission at the Delta Omega Poster Competition. Her contributions led to her induction into the Delta Omega National Honorary Society in Public Health. Kaitlyn plans to continue her career in infectious diseases as a research technician, with a particular focus on arbovirology. She hopes her work will advance the understanding of arboviral diseases.

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Avery Mae Liggon, from Madison, Wisconsin, is graduating with a bachelor of arts in communications with a minor in political science. One of Avery's most meaningful accomplishments was expanding the National Panhellenic Conference (NPHC) presence on campus, creating more opportunities for students to engage with organizations

focused on scholarship, leadership and service. As president of the Omicron Psi Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated, and the 2024–2025 NPHC president, Avery played a pivotal role in strengthening the Tulane community. Another highlight of Avery's experience was working with the International Dance Festival for two years, combining a love for the arts with event planning and cultural outreach. Supporting international artists and coordinating performances allowed Avery to celebrate diversity and global connections through dance. Beyond formal roles, Avery values the supportive network of friends who motivate and inspire each other that she has built at Tulane. After graduation, Avery plans to pursue a master's in sports studies at Tulane while working with the Tulane Football team as a graduate assistant, continuing a journey of leadership and service. Kayleigh Macumber, from

La Grange, Kentucky, is graduating with a bachelor of architecture. Kayleigh's time in New Orleans has shaped her approach to the work she does. In Professor Liz Camuti's National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine Research Studio, Kayleigh researched the importance of critiquing the labor in resiliency



work and developed an abolitionist framework separating future projects from carceral labor. This class helped her shape research into solutions and reaffirmed her belief that the stories she values can exist within her profession. Selected for a yearlong fellowship with Virginia Sea Grant, Kayleigh conducted design research on the working waterfront in the Chesapeake Bay, focusing on resilience strategies for an oyster hatchery facing subsidence and inundation. Collaborating with community members and experts, she mapped scenarios of sea level rise and storm surge, creating impactful design proposals. Kayleigh is currently working at SCAPE, a nationally recognized landscape architecture firm in New Orleans, where she combines her love of illustration and storytelling with ecological and cultural design practices. Her contributions include drawings featured in the Nelson Atkins Museum Addition Competition. After graduation, Kayleigh plans to remain in New Orleans, pursuing interdisciplinary opportunities that connect advocacy, design and storytelling.



Jack Thomas McDonnell, from Chicago, is graduating with a doctor of medicine. During the nearly ten years Jack has been at Tulane, he has focused on community. That connection is illustrative of the community building Jack found at Tulane and is why he is excited to stay in New Orleans for his pediatrics residency at Manning Family Children's Hospital. Rachel Alex Moody, of

Colorado Springs, Colorado, is graduating with bachelor of arts degrees in political economy, Latin American studies and Spanish. Rachel's honors thesis on the legal and media representation of female bosses in Latin American drug cartels is a culmination of the diverse interests she explored



while at Tulane. As president of Tower and Crescent, Tulane's student-alumni association, she expanded the group's reach and collaborated with faculty and alumni to enrich undergraduates' experiences. Rachel is most proud of her work as a citizenship and ESL instructor in New Orleans. For the past four years, Rachel has worked with immigrant populations striving toward new opportunities through sacrifice and hard work.
